1. You see a shocking news story on social media claiming a famous personality did something illegal. Your friends are sharing it everywhere. What do you do?
  - (a) Share it with others immediately—everyone should know.
  - (b) Check reliable news sources before believing or sharing.
  - (c) Ignore it completely because it's none of your business.
  - (d) Comment on the post, saying it must be fake without verifying.
2. Your best friend's parents *yell at your teacher* during a meeting, accusing her of unfair grading. Your friend supports their parents, but you know the teacher is fair. What do you do?
  - (a) Stay silent to avoid offending your friend.
  - (b) Defend the teacher publicly and risk upsetting your friend.
  - (c) Talk to your friend privately about fairness.
  - (d) Agree with your friend even though you know it's unfair.
3. Your school *bans a traditional festival celebration* because some students don't celebrate it. A debate starts in school about whether the ban is right or wrong. What would you do?
  - (a) Support the ban to ensure nobody feels excluded.
  - (b) Argue that banning a festival is unfair to those who celebrate it.
  - (c) Stay silent to avoid controversy.
  - (d) Suggest an inclusive way to celebrate different traditions.
4. Your school wants to install an AI-based *cheating detection system* for online exams. However, students complain that it wrongly flags innocent students. As part of the *student tech committee*, you must decide what to do.
  - (a) Suggest using *human reviewers* along with AI to avoid mistakes.
  - (b) Ignore student complaints—the system is meant to catch cheaters.
  - (c) Allow students to *challenge AI decisions* before being punished.
  - (d) Recommend stopping the system until AI improves.
5. Your school has *only one wheelchair*, and it's *old and difficult to use*. A new student who needs it *struggles* with mobility. The school hasn't replaced it due to budget constraints. What is your first step?
  - (a) Interview the student to understand their biggest struggles and then try solving them.
  - (b) Write a petition demanding an immediate replacement.
  - (c) Assume the wheelchair is fine since others have used it before.
  - (d) Suggest raising money but without knowing the real issues first.
6. You find an online influencer claiming to *double your money* within a month using a special "investment trick." Many students in your school have already invested and claim to have made quick profits. What will you do?
  - (a) Invest a small amount to test it, since everyone else is making money.
  - (b) Research about investment frauds and warn your classmates.
  - (c) Ask your parents, but still consider investing if it looks good.
  - (d) Invest a large sum before the opportunity disappears.





7. Someone has created a *fake social media account* impersonating a student in your class and is posting embarrassing things about them. Nobody knows who is behind it, but your friends think it's funny. What will you do?
- (a) Secretly report the account to the platform and an adult.
  - (b) Stay quiet because you don't want to be the next target.
  - (c) Join in by commenting to avoid looking weak.
  - (d) Find out who made the account but only warn them privately.
8. You have saved ₹ 5,000 over the past year for something you really want. Suddenly, a family emergency arises, and your parents are struggling with expenses. They haven't asked for your money, but you know it could help. What do you do?
- (a) Offer the entire amount without hesitation.
  - (b) Keep your money because you worked hard for it.
  - (c) Offer a part of it while keeping the rest for yourself.
  - (d) Lend the money to your parents but expect it back.
9. Amit's friends have started buying expensive sneakers from a trendy brand. They constantly talk about how stylish and cool these shoes make them look. Amit, however, has been saving money for a new bicycle that he really wants. One of his friends teases him, saying, "Come on, don't be so boring! Everyone is getting them."

Now, Amit feels pressured to spend his savings on the sneakers instead of the bicycle. What should he do?

Choose the most appropriate response:

- (a) Give in and buy the sneakers immediately to fit in with his friends.
  - (b) Stick to his financial goal and keep saving for the bicycle he truly wants.
  - (c) Buy the sneakers now but try to save money again later.
  - (d) Compare the long-term value of both purchases and decide based on his priorities.
10. Ravi and his friends started a small homemade candle business for a school project. After a few successful sales, they received a big order from a local shop. However, just when they were about to start production, one of their key team members quit unexpectedly. Without their help, fulfilling the order on time seems impossible.
- What should Ravi do?
- (a) Cancel the order and accept that their business is not ready yet.
  - (b) Find a way to reorganize tasks and ask other teammates to pitch in extra effort.
  - (c) Tell the shop that the order will be delayed but still try to fulfill it.
  - (d) Take on all the work alone and stay up all night trying to complete it.
11. Your school wants to introduce a *digital library* for students, but many are *not tech-savvy*. You are tasked with designing the first version. What should you focus on first?
- (a) Create a simple, easy-to-use version for testing.
  - (b) Build a *complex* system with many features at once.
  - (c) Release the library without any feedback.
  - (d) Copy an existing app without customizing it.
12. Your school introduces a new learning system where students are encouraged to ask questions. However, many students remain silent, even if they don't understand concepts. What should you do first?





- (a) Talk to students to understand why they hesitate to speak.
  - (b) Suggest stricter rules forcing students to participate.
  - (c) Assume students are just shy and let the system continue.
  - (d) Design an anonymous Q&A method before asking for opinions.
13. During a class discussion, you got frustrated when a classmate mocked your idea in front of everyone. Without thinking, you snapped back rudely, making the class go silent. Later, you realize that your reaction may have been too harsh.
- How should you handle the situation?
- (a) Ignore it—what’s said is said, and they deserved it.
  - (b) Reflect on why you reacted that way and apologize to your classmate.
  - (c) Avoid the classmate from now on to prevent future conflicts.
  - (d) Ask a friend if your reaction was justified before deciding whether to apologize.
14. It’s your best friend’s birthday party, and you’ve been looking forward to it for weeks. However, on the same day, your teacher announces that you’ve been selected for the final round of an inter-school competition, which is a big opportunity for you. Your friend gets upset and says, “You always put competitions before me. If you don’t come, maybe we’re not really best friends.”
- What should you do?
- (a) Skip the competition and go to the party to avoid upsetting your friend.
  - (b) Explain to your friend why the competition is important but promise to celebrate together later.
  - (c) Argue with your friend, telling them they are being unfair and selfish.
  - (d) Try to attend both, even if it means being late to the party.
15. You are traveling on a *crowded bus*, and you notice an *elderly woman* standing near you. She looks tired and is struggling to keep her balance. At the same time, a *young man* sitting nearby is busy on his phone and doesn’t seem to notice her. You are also feeling tired after a long day at school.
- What should you do?
- (a) Offer your seat to the elderly woman and politely ask the young man if he would be willing to give up his seat if needed.
  - (b) Stay seated because you are also tired, and it’s not your responsibility.
  - (c) Ignore the situation because the young man should be the one to offer his seat, not you.
  - (d) Get up and give your seat to the woman, but feel frustrated that others aren’t being considerate.
